4. Course Descrip	tion
Course Description	This course introduces the leading theories in development economics and their empirical applications. Our aim is to understand why some countries remain underdeveloped and the extent to which policies can shape growth and development. After an overview of the classic models of economic growth, the course will discuss the importance of institutions, politics, factor accumulation and inequality, among others, in economic development. As a result of taking the course students are expected to understand both classic and frontier theories of economic development, and to be able to conduct preliminary research in an empirical fashion.
Prerequisites	ECON1210 Introductory Microeconomics and ECON1220 Introductory Macroeconomics. For students of the BASc (GHD) programme, the pre-requisite is GHAD1002 Introductory Economics and Finance. (Note: students with knowledge of econometrics or statistics will benefit more from this course).
