Language of instruction

The language of instruction at UNSW is English.

Course load

You are required to enrol in a full-time load at UNSW. The normal full-time load is 18 units of credit per term and 24 units of credit for tailored terms (3 subjects per term or 4 subjects per tailored term). It is not possible to underload or overload.

Course selection

For a complete list of UNSW courses, term availability, class times and content outlines, view the UNSW Handbook⁴. See our instructions⁵ for searching for courses if you need help navigating the handbook. You can also refer to our Winter Term Course Guide⁶ for courses that are expected to run in the Winter Term. When selecting courses, it is important to be flexible.

- You must meet any course prerequisites. This is assessed at the time of application. New courses can be submitted for approval post acceptance.
- Check your proposed courses are offered in the term you will be on exchange.
- You should have back up courses to allow for changes upon arrival in the case of a course not running or timetable clashes. Faculties are unlikely to approve timetable clashes. We recommend you submit course approval for all back up courses as early as possible.
- You must enrol in a full-time load each term. It is not possible to overload.
- You should discuss your proposed courses (and back up options) with your home university and have these approved by them in advance.
- You are expected to study with UNSW for the entire duration of your study plan, including all exams and assessments.
- Generally undergraduate students are not able to enrol in graduate courses, but there may be some limited options for Law and some Science and Engineering subjects.
- It is generally not possible for graduate students to enrol in undergraduate courses.

Equitable Learning Services

Equitable Learning Services⁷ provide a range of services to students with disabilities, including note takers, classwork support, assistive technology and exam adjustments.

If you receive educational adjustments at your home university, you need to register with UNSW Equitable Learning Services prior to study commencement to ensure the appropriate services are in place by the time you start at UNSW. You will not be registered automatically.

Support services in Australia may be different to those offered at your home university (for example, adjustments for extra time in exams may be shorter). While at UNSW you will receive the same educational adjustments as local students, and it is best to make enquiries about what services may be available to you before you arrive.

Course restrictions



While most courses are open to exchange students with the required academic background, some courses are restricted or not available to exchange students.

- Exchange students are limited to taking one online course only. Check with your home university in advance too as they may have additional restrictions for online courses.
- Courses in the Winter Term are limited and are generally electives, we recommend you are flexible.
- Postgraduate students who are in their first semester and who do not have a transcript with results for their postgraduate studies at time of application should select first year postgraduate courses. Upper-level postgraduate courses will not be approved without a transcript demonstrating you meet any prerequisite courses, and you need to provide your transcript at least 6 weeks before term start date to be able to request enrolment in these courses at UNSW.

Faculty of Law & Justice

- Enrolment is restricted to Law Majors. Coursework is available at undergraduate and postgraduate level
- Juris Doctor courses are open to students enrolled in a Juris Doctor Program at their home institution
- Students are not able to take both LAWS and JURD courses simultaneously
- LLM elective courses are open to Law Exchange students
- Undergraduate and JD law enrolment for Exchange students is capped, and students are encouraged to also look at LLM elective courses
- Core courses are not available to Exchange students
- Course LAWS3331 is not available to Exchange students

Faculty of Arts, Design & Architecture

The Arts & Media, Education, Humanities & Languages, Social Sciences

- Students wishing to take stage 3 ARTS courses must be majoring in the desired field
- Undergraduate students can only enrol in undergraduate courses
- Postgraduate students are not eligible to take undergraduate courses
- INST, GLST, DANC, EDST, MDIA and Music courses are restricted to declared majors

Art & Design

- Courses are held at the Paddington campus, approximately 20 minutes away – a free shuttle bus service⁸ is available
- Priority will be given to students majoring in Art/Design
- Students can take a mix of courses from Paddington and Kensington (main) campus, as long as they are aware of the travel involved

Built Environment

- Students are limited to one studio-based course due to space limitations and should be flexible with subject choices

UNSW Business School

The following courses are not available to exchange students:

- Industrial Training courses including MARK2999, MARK3999, MARK4999, FINS3100, FINS3200

Faculty of Medicine & Health

- Exchange students can enrol in courses from the School of Medical Science however courses in the Doctor of Medicine program are not open to exchange students.

Faculty of Engineering

- Enrolment in Biomedical Engineering and Computer Science courses is extremely limited; students need to be prepared to select courses from another major.

Faculty of Science

- Postgraduate psychology courses are not available to exchange students.
- Undergraduate psychology courses are very limited.

Courses not open for exchange

- MBA Coursework
- Courses that are part of the Honours degree (4xxx)
- UNSW Canberra at the Australian Defence Force Academy (all courses starting with 'z')
- Doctor of Medicine program

Term information and dates



The UNSW academic calendar comprises of three terms as well as a Summer Term in January (ST) and Winter (WT) intensive term in August.

For semester-based programs, you have the choice of 3 courses over a standard Term, or 4 courses over a Double or Tailored Term. For yearlong programs, you can take 8 courses. Please note the course sequence below.

At the point of nomination, your home university needs to enter a term selection⁹ for you. This determines your length of study and terms you will be at UNSW. Please discuss your term options with your home university.

Term Options

Three courses (18 UNSW credits, 22.5 ECTS)

If you would like to study 3 courses, you can choose from:

- Term 1 (T1) which is from February to mid-May and has a course sequence of 3
- Term 3 (T3) which is from September to mid-December and has a course sequence of 3

Four courses (24 UNSW credits, 30 ECTS)

If you would like to study 4 courses, you can choose from:

- Tailored Term 1 (ST +T1) which is from January to mid-May and has a course sequence of 1+3
- Tailored Term 3 (WT + T3) which is from August to mid-December and has a course sequence of 1+3
- Term 1 + Term 2 (T1+T2) which is from February to late August and has a course sequence of 2+2
- Term 3 + Summer Term (T3+ST) which is from September to early February of following year and has a course sequence of 3+1

Six courses (36 UNSW credits, 45 ECTS)

If you would like to study 6 courses, you can choose:

- Term 3 + Term 1 (T3+T1) which is from September to mid-May of following year and has a course sequence of 3+3

Eight courses (48 UNSW credits, 60 ECTS)

If you would like to study 8 courses or one year, you can choose:

- Term 1 + Term 2 + Term 3 (T1+T2+T3) which is from February to mid-December and has a course sequence of 3+2+3
- Term 3 + Term 1 + Term 2 (T3+T1+T2) which is from September to late August of following year. and has a course sequence of 3+3+2
- Tailored Term 3 and Tailored Term 1 (WT +T3 + ST + T1) which is from August to mid-May of following year and has a course sequence of 1+3+1+3

Term dates

You are required to study with UNSW for the entire session and exam period. Your personal exam timetable will be released mid term and you should not make travel arrangements until you have received your exam timetable.

Orientation

All Exchange students are required to attend an in-person compulsory orientation according to their start term. It is normally held the week before Term starts. Details are confirmed closer to the time.

Applications



How to apply

Our application is completely online. You first need to be nominated by your home university (please do not make a direct application through our website). Nomination information will be emailed to your home university separately.

Once nominated, an email is sent to you with information on how to submit your application. Please check the terms you have been nominated for as changes cannot be made after applications are submitted. You also need to upload the following documents as part of your application by the application deadline. We do not require hard copies of applications. We send offers and enrolment information after the application deadline.

1. Official academic transcript (with English translation, if applicable). Unofficial copies or screenshots cannot be accepted.
2. Valid passport (ID page). Please make sure you have a valid passport at time of application.

3. Proof of English language¹² proficiency, if applicable.

Deadlines

Tailored Term 1 & Term 1

- Nomination deadline: 5 October
- Application deadline: 15 October

Tailored Term 3 & Term 3

- Nomination deadline: 26 March
- Application deadline: 1 April

All dates are Sydney time (AEDT). We send offers and visa documentation after the application deadline. It is not possible to change your term selection once your application has been submitted.

Language requirements

UNSW recognizes these countries¹³ as English-speaking. If you do not hold a passport for one of the countries listed, you need to submit proof of your English proficiency by the application deadline. You can do this by providing evidence that you meet one of UNSW's approved^{14 15} criteria¹⁶. English proficiency is an entry requirement, and we cannot accept students into the Exchange Program without it. Proof of English that does not meet one of the UNSW's approved^{17 18} criteria¹⁹ cannot be accepted.

It is important to check you meet our English requirements before being nominated by your home university. It is too late to sit a test after our application deadline if you don't meet our entry requirements. You should arrange your language tests at least 6 months in advance.

English Language Test Scores

UNSW accepts a number of English language²⁰ test scores to meet our English language requirements provided:

- You have completed the test no more than two years before your intended start date at UNSW, the English test must be dated on or after the 1st of January (two years prior) for Summer Term

and Term 1 commencement, or the 1st of August (two years prior) for Winter Term or Term 3 commencement.

- You achieve the minimum score (e.g 6.5 for IELTS Academic version or 90 TOEFL (iBT)).

Exchange students are only required to meet the overall score for IELTS and TOEFL, you do not need to meet each of the subtests. Note: TOEFL MyBest scores is not a recognized or accepted language test.

You should register for an English language test early to avoid delays.

Post-Secondary or Tertiary Qualifications in English

If you have successfully completed at least **one consecutive year of full-time** study at a Bachelor level or higher where the sole language of instruction and assessment was English, you are not required to undertake a language test if you can provide a statement or certificate from your home university confirming this. The study must have been completed no more than **two years** prior to the commencement of your Exchange at UNSW.

Senior Secondary Qualifications

UNSW recognizes some academic qualifications²¹ completed in non-English speaking countries. Qualifications must have been undertaken no more than **two years** prior to your intended start date at UNSW, with the exception of qualifications from Denmark, Germany, Sweden or Norway, which must be undertaken no more than **ten years** prior to your intended start date at UNSW.

For Other acceptable criteria please see UNSW English language requirements ²²

The Australian Government also has requirements for student visas. You must verify and meet any visa requirements.

Grade requirements

You should have equivalent to either a credit average or 3.0 GPA

Housing, living costs & Student Life



On-campus Housing

UNSW affiliated Colleges and Apartments²³ provide high quality accommodation, and you should apply directly to the College or Apartment as early as possible. Please make sure you select the affiliated options when using the above link. On campus accommodation is extremely limited and is not guaranteed even if you apply by the deadline.

Off-campus Housing

Most exchange students choose to live off campus and enjoy the beautiful suburbs that surround UNSW. Sydney is a safe city, with public transport connecting the UNSW campuses, beaches, and city centre.

- Resources and advice²⁴
- We recommend students arrive 1-2 weeks early to find off campus accommodation. You may wish to book temporary accommodation²⁵ to allow time to find more permanent housing.

- Off campus accommodation is not be endorsed by UNSW and you should take all precautions to secure safe housing, learn about your rights as a tenant²⁶.

You should never arrange off-campus accommodation or transfer money from overseas.

Student Accommodation Providers

Sydney has several accommodation providers catering specially to students. These providers are located around Sydney – generally around 20-50 minutes by public transport from the UNSW campus. These options offer high-quality rooms with extra services and Facilities. Options include Iglu²⁷ and Scape²⁸

[Approximate living costs](#)

We recommend around AU\$10,000 – AU\$12,000 per half year and AU\$19,000 – AU\$23,000 per year for an in-person exchange. Please note that this is for the basics ²⁹and does not include holiday travel and entertainment costs.

You may also wish to refer to the Study Australia Cost of Living Calculator (studyaustralia.gov.au)³⁰ to get an estimate on how much it could cost to have the lifestyle you choose in Australia.

Unless you are contacted with confirmation of a scholarship from UNSW, there are no other available funding opportunities. Students are responsible for funding their own exchange.

Insurance & OSHC



Overseas Student Health Cover

An Australian student visa requires you to have Overseas Student Health Cover³² (OSHC) for its full duration (most students from Belgium, Norway and Sweden are exempt). OSHC is a government requirement and cannot be waived with off-shore health insurance and/or comprehensive travel insurance.

The UNSW's preferred provider is Medibank. Further instructions are provided upon acceptance.

Working

Student visas allow you to work once you have commenced your course at UNSW. You can work up to 40 hours a fortnight during session and unlimited hours when your course is not in session.

UNSW Employability³³ can assist you with your resume and interview preparation.
