PROGRAMMES AND COURSES	
Types of programmes	Students can study at Hull for one trimester or a full academic year (two trimesters), on one of the following programmes. Exchange: For both EU and non-EU students studying at a university that has an exchange agreement with us. No tuition fees will apply. Study Abroad (fee-paying short-term programmes): For students at a university that does not have an exchange agreement with the University of Hull. Tuition fees will apply.
Courses	Updated Module Handbooks will be made available in due course. In the meantime please see the following website for an insight into the type of modules that are available with our degree programmes: Inbound Exchanges and Visiting Students modules University of Hull Please note modules are subject to change and constraints (timetabling, not running, prerequisites and capacity). Module information on offer for your application will be available at application stage.
Modules and Credits	You are likely to study three modules per semester. However we ask you to choose more modules, as some of your choices may not be available. Most modules earn you 20 credits and you may take up to 60 credits per trimester. The total number of credits you should take are: One trimester: 60 credits (30 ECTS) Full year: 120 credits (60 ECTS)

Module exceptions and restrictions	<p>Nursing, Psychology and Law modules are only available where a direct agreement exists between your department at your home university and the University of Hull. Please seek advice from your home coordinator and do not choose these modules if an agreement does not exist.</p> <p>Certain Social Work and Youth and Community Development modules are unavailable due to restrictions around being able to work with vulnerable people/children) in the UK.</p> <p>Regrettably we do not offer any exchange opportunities onto our Medicine programmes.</p>																																
Entry Requirements	<p>Academic Entry Requirements You will need to be a current student in good academic standing at your university and have completed at least one year of your course. Each application is then considered individually.</p> <p>English Language Requirements for Exchange students All classes are taught in English. Students must therefore have a high level of spoken and written English. Where English is not the first language documentation will be required to confirm this.</p> <p><u>Single Trimester Students</u></p> <p>You are required to provide a letter from your home university confirming that your level of English is a minimum of B2, alongside with any relevant documentation (certificate or similar). You will enter the UK on a Standard Visitor Visa.</p> <p><u>Full Year Students</u></p> <p>As you are studying for a full academic year you will need to provide evidence of your English proficiency (ELP). This must be one of these accepted tests. You will need to apply for a student visa before entry to the UK.</p>																																
Credit Conversions	<p>Credit transfers differ between universities and countries. Decide if you want to study at Hull for a year or one trimester	You can study at Hull for a single trimester or for a Full Year (2 trimesters) only. You must confirm your choice with your home university.
Get a formal nomination from your University or register your interest with us	<p><u>Your home university has an agreement with the University of Hull</u> Ask your University to contact incoming-mobility@hull.ac.uk to inform us that you are interested in coming to Hull to study for either one or two trimesters.</p> <p><u>Your home University does not have a formal agreement with the University of Hull</u> Email your expression of interest to come and study at Hull as a fee-paying student to: globalhull@hull.ac.uk. Please give details of your home university, subjects studied, level of study and how long you would like to spend at the University of Hull.</p>
Nomination Deadlines	<p>The nomination deadline for study at the University during 2024-2025 for a September trimester start is 30 April 2024.</p> <p>On the day that nominations open the Global Experience Team will email a nomination form link to partners with instructions on how to nominate students to the University of Hull.</p>
Preparing your Application:	<p>You will need the following documents for your online application:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • The formal nomination from your home University, if applicable. • A colour copy of your current, valid passport • A transcript of your results from your University studies achieved so far. A transcript is an official list of all of the courses you have taken to date, indicating the grades you have achieved. • A letter of recommendation from an academic member of staff at your university, stating how the member of staff knows you, why you are suitable for the course and confirming that you are of good academic standing. • Evidence you meet the English language requirements. Submit your application online	Once your nomination has been received from your home university we will email you a link to your online application form when the application opens and provide you with further information about studying at the University of Hull and how to apply.
Application Deadlines	<p><u>Trimester 1 & Full Year Application Deadlines</u></p> <p>Trimester 1 & Full Year application window: 1 April - 15 June 2024.</p> <p><u>Trimester 2 Application Deadlines</u></p> <p>Trimester 2 only application window closes: 1 November 2024.</p> <p>We are unable to accept late applications. Any applications submitted past the deadline will not be considered.</p>
Choose your Modules	<p>You are likely to study three modules per semester, but we ask you to choose more modules in case some of your choices are not available.</p> <p>Most modules are worth 20 credits (10 ECTS), and you may take up to 60 credits per trimester.</p> <p>The total number of credits you should take are: One trimester: 60 credits (30 ECTS) Full year: 120 credits (60 ECTS)</p>
Receive your Email Confirmation	We will email you to confirm your place at the University of Hull and with details of what to do next.
Apply for your Visa (If Applicable)	All international students may require a visa to study in the UK. We will email you with information about visa applications and UK entry documents. The information you receive will depend on the length of your study and modules you have chosen.

Arrange your accommodation	<p>Students are provided with accommodation application details together with the study application form. We will email you details about how to apply in your course confirmation. Pay fees, if applicable	<p>There are no additional tuition fees for exchange and Erasmus students.</p> <p>If your tuition fees are not covered by your home institution, you will need to pay them yourself. Opening a bank account	<p>During your first two weeks, you will have the opportunity to open a bank account.</p> <p>It is sometimes difficult for students who are studying for up to six months to open an account. However some banks allows students to open basic or savings accounts.</p> <p>There are several different banks to choose from, if you have not already decided. Please visit the banks and select which one you would like to use. If you are arriving in September, you will have the opportunity to meet different bank representatives on campus.</p> <p>To open a bank account you will need to show the bank:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • your passport • your letter of offer to study at the University • an introductory letter from the Central Hub, Student Central Building

<p>Registering with a GP</p>	<p>If you're moving to Hull you have the option to register with a GP (General Practitioner in a doctor's surgery or medical centre).</p> <p>You will normally register as an NHS patient with a doctor's surgery or medical centre, rather than with an individual doctor. You should try to register with a GP surgery as soon as you arrive in the UK; do not wait until you become unwell, as you may not be able to get the health care you need.</p> <p>The easiest way to find a GP near you is to visit the NHS Choices website and enter the postcode of your student accommodation, please see http://www.nhs.uk/Service-Search/GP/LocationSearch/4</p> <p>You may also have the opportunity to register with a GP during Welcome Week on campus.</p>
<p>Medical Insurance</p>	<p>You must have adequate medical insurance before travelling. You can still register with a GP surgery, but may be required to pay for any subsequent or ongoing consultations or medical treatments.</p>
<p>Visa</p>	<p>Depending on your country of origin, you may need a visa to study in the UK. We will email you with information about visa applications and UK entry documents.
